KAMLOOPS — Interior boaters are being urged to make safety a top priority when out on the water this May long weekend.

North American Safe Boating Awareness Week takes place across Canada from May 20th to May 26th.

The week is focused on promoting safe and responsible boating practices for the 14 million Canadians who participate in the recreational activity.

"We're holding it at this time of the year because this weekend is the unofficial start to the boating weekend," said [Ian Gilson with the Canadian Safe Boating Council](#). "We're wanting to remind people of five key messages when it comes to boating safety. The most important one is to wear a life jacket. If you fall overboard and the boat starts drifting away, you may never be able to catch up."

Other safety tips include:

- Wearing a lifejacket
- Never drinking and boating
- Taking a safe boating course
- Undergoing a property safety check of your vessel before casting off.

While boating fatalities are on the decrease, the CSBC says still an average of 100 boating-related deaths every year in Canada.

OPP Partners with CSBC for Safe Boating Week

(ORILLIA, ON) – The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have already investigated three boating fatalities this spring, with the same contributing factors being reported as in previous years.

Two of the three fatal incidents involved capsized canoes. During the third mishap, the vessel sank. Alcohol/drug consumption was involved in two of the incidents. Only one of the three deceased was wearing a life jacket or personal flotation device (PFD) at the time. One victim was a passenger.

These details are all too common in OPP-investigated boating incidents from year to year. Last year (2016), 16 vessel operators and seven (7) passengers were killed in 19 boating incidents on OPP-patrolled waterways. Nine (9) of the incidents involved a capsized vessel. Six (6) victims fell overboard. Alcohol consumption was a factor in six (6) occurrences.

Few victims were found to be wearing a life jacket - a statistic that has not changed from year to year. The exception was in 2015 when -- for the first time in more than ten years -- all 18 of the deceased were recovered without life jackets.

Safe Boating Council promotes use of PFD when on the water

The Victoria Day weekend signals the start of boating season in Canada and with that comes the responsibility of making sure you and the passengers on your craft are safe.

That includes making sure you and all your passengers are wearing approved Personal Flotation Devices (PFD).

The Safe Boating Council held its annual PFD day at the Island Lake Conservation Area on Saturday, May 20, to bring awareness to the importance of making sure you are prepared when heading out on the water.

Volunteers, who are also avid canoe and kayak enthusiasts turned out to help people take part in the day which is held around the world to set a new record for people all wearing their life saving gear on the same day.

Organizer David Donaldson brought most of the participants through an adventure group that he runs.

"The event is done through the Safe Boating Council of Canada in conjunction with the same council in the U.S. It's an international event where we try to break the record for the most people wearing PFD every year," Mr. Donaldson explained. "A couple of years ago we hit 10,000 people which is the record and we are trying to beat that. There are events happening all around the world. This event is used to start off Safe Boating Week since this is kind of the unofficial start of Summer in North America."

Many boaters are negligent when it comes to safety or just don't think it will happen to them.

But a sudden accident on the water can end with dire consequences.

"In Canada there is about 166 people who drown every year in boating events. The vast majority, over 90 per cent have life jackets on board but aren't wearing them," Mr. Donaldson said. "A lot of people think they can put their life jacket on after they hit the water - but it's almost impossible."

The Safe Boating Council encourages everyone to wear a PFD when they are on the water this summer.
